COUNCIL CORNER

"Super Voluntary Annexation"

If you've been paying attention, you'll have noticed a lot of annexations going on in New Haven. We've had five through City Council in just the past two months alone. All of these annexations are "Super Voluntary Annexations". That means the property owners (either living on the property or a developer) wish to be inside the City limits of New Haven. The advantages of this include access to City water and sewer, New Haven Police and Fire protection, trash pickup, and services of our Public Works department including snow plowing and leaf pickup. It makes the developments much more attractive to market.

In 2015, the Indiana Senate Enrolled Act 330 was passed. This made changes to how annexations were handled and made Involuntary Annexations very difficult. The term "Super Voluntary Annexations" describes all of our current annexations. The rules for those include: 100% of the property owners in the annexed area must be in favor of the annexation; a public hearing must be held within 30 days of the application; a fiscal plan has to be created describing how the annexation will affect City finances and tax rate; as well as many other conditions. Council then has to pass the annexation ordinance with two readings and votes. Generally, the annexed area will provide more benefits and tax income than the cost to the City to provide services. If an annexation doesn't make sense for the fiscal well-being of the City, it most likely would be voted down.

So hang on. The annexations and some re-zoning processes are just the first steps in the many great things coming to New Haven in the near future.

The New Haven Police Department Accepting Applications for the Reserve Police Officer Program

Applications will be accepted until Friday September 30, 2022 by 4:00pm. Applicants must be 21 years of age and possess a valid Indiana driver's license. Each Reserve Officer is required to work a minimum of 16 hours per month. Each officer receives training in Criminal Law, Firearms, Emergency Vehicle Operations, Defensive Tactics, Traffic Law, and more. This program also serves other police-related activities as directed by the Board of Control, and/or the Board of Public Works and Safety for the City of New Haven.

The function of the Police Reserve is to aid and assist the New Haven Police Department in:

- Detecting and apprehending violators of the law
- Directing the movement of pedestrians and vehicles on all public properties
- Dispersing unlawful or dangerous assemblies
- Enforcing all federal laws, state laws, and city ordinances
- Preserving the peace
- Preventing crime
- Protecting personal and public property
- Protecting personal rights
- Provide police assistance at fires, public gatherings etc. as may be needed
- Safeguarding public health and safety
- Suppressing all unlawful disorderly conduct or practices

NEW HAVEN WATER CUSTOMERS ANNUAL FIRE HYDRANT FLUSHING SCHEDULE



The New Haven Utility Department will begin its annual fire hydrant flushing during the month of September. Please see the schedule of dates below when we plan to be in your area. When flushing occurs in your vicinity, extra precautions should be taken to ensure no problems occur in your household. On days flushing occurs in your area, please avoid doing laundry. If you cannot avoid doing laundry, please be sure NOT to wash any white clothing.

The process of flushing normally disturbs the water mains and could cause iron (rusty water) in the system. The iron will normally not last long. If iron persists in your water, open as many water sources as possible within your home and let the water flow for approximately five (5) minutes until the water clears. If discoloring persists, please call the New Haven Water Department Office at 748-7050 between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. We regret any inconvenience that this may cause and appreciate your cooperation.

Section I: September 19, 20, 21 All fire hydrants west of Hartzell Road (Meadowbrook, Heatherwood, Ridgeview, Woodfield, Castlerock)

Section II: September 21, 22, 23 All fire hydrants east of Hartzell Road and west of Werling Road, Valley Creek and Arrow Haven: (Cottonwood, Walnut Ridge, Lakewood, Ashford Lakes, Sturm and Woodridge)

Section III: September 26, 27, 28 All fire hydrants east of Werling Road and west of Green Road, not including Valley Creek and Arrow Haven: (Straford, Pinestone, Scarborough, Timbercreek, Barber's Point, Main and Powers)

Section IV: September 28, 29, 30 All fire hydrants east of Green Road and Green Street: (Highland Terrace, Tanglewood, Cameron Creek and Canal Ridge)



2022 NEW HAVEN LEAF COLLECTION

The New Haven Utility Department will begin its annual leaf pick up later in October. The start date will be determined by Superintendent Dave Jones based on when leaves actually begin falling. Superintendent Jones said, "It's difficult to predict when the season will change and leaves begin to fall. For updates on leaf pick up in your area, please visit our website at www.newhaven.in.gov or go to our Facebook page at City of New Haven Indiana."

When leaves begin to fall, please have your leaves on the park strip between the sidewalk and curb (not in the street). Please keep away from street signs, poles, mailboxes and parked cars. All leaves will be picked up as crews make their way through the city.

Bagged leaves will not be accepted as this will inhibit the pick-up process and the bags are not conducive to composting.

Leaves that are picked up are recycled into compost, which is available (free of charge) at the Utility Complex located at 2201 Summit Street.

SEPTEMBER IS NATIONAL LITERACY MONTH

By getting books in the hands of kids, you can help engage these young readers in their learning and help them see how school, community, and the world beyond are connected. That is one way parents, educators and other caring adults join forces to meet the needs of a child.

Take your youngest reader to the library, get some great books and sit down together and read out loud. Help your more advanced readers find books they'll enjoy on their own. Take time to share the reading experience with the children in your life. Ask them to read their favorite books to you and then ask questions about them. Talk about your favorite books and authors and ask your young readers about their favorite books. You might be surprised how much fun it can be for both you and the children in your life.



The Literacy Alliance

Literacy is key to many issues facing our community. When you improve literacy, you impact many areas such as employment, public safety, healthcare and our economy. The Literacy Alliance strives to end illiteracy by teaching adults through learning centers, literacy programs, and tutoring services that empower individuals to succeed at work, at home, and in the community.

Additionally, improving adult literacy impacts family literacy. Odds are if parents struggle with reading, their child will struggle as well. Their mission is to break this cycle. In Allen County, there are 30,000 adults age 18 or older who do not have a high school diploma. Only 4% of those adults are enrolled in a literacy program.

The Literacy Alliance is committed to changing those statistics through adult literacy services, collaboration with other organizations, and valuable volunteer and community support. Since 1988, The Literacy Alliance has helped adults improve the skills they need to work, live, and raise their families. This includes adults who received their high school equivalency diplomas after studying through their programs.

The Literacy Alliance matches volunteer tutors with adult students who are struggling with reading. Once matched, students and tutors set learning objectives that help students achieve their educational goals.
