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



The Indiana General Assembly meets every year to consider policies for the state. During an even number year, they meet at the beginning of January and mid-March. On odd number years, they meet at the beginning of January until the end of April. During the long session they have one statutory requirement, and that is to pass a biennial budget.

Each session is broken up into two parts. During the first half of sessions, bills are filed and heard in the house that it originated in. During the second part of sessions, bills that pass the originating chamber switch to the other chamber for consideration. This year, 489 senate bills and 673 house bills were filed.

COUNCIL CORNER

Your City of New Haven Administration has begun the new year with a very busy schedule. Along with all the developer based projects and plans for a lot more road repair this summer, the City has a couple large projects of their own.


We're finalizing the plans and have approved the bonding for our Public Safety expansion. City Hall was built over 20 years ago and at that time, they planned for expansion by building a shell upstairs but not finishing it at the time. Since then, we've finished out the upstairs and now are out of room again. With our police force growing every year, along with all of New Haven, they are past capacity. The plan is to remodel and expand parts of City Hall to increase the public safety area. This will be accomplished by repurposing the Council Chambers to become part of the police department and adding on to the back of the building to create a new Council Chamber and additional office space. Again, we'll have additional square footage included in an upstairs area for future growth. The interior just won't be finished. This will take care of a lot of issues with heating and cooling, safety and security, and optimizing the space for our current usage. Construction will begin this summer. City Council will be moved elsewhere from this fall to the first part of next year during construction.

The other huge project involves our wastewater treatment. We've been under an order from the Indiana Department of Energy Management (IDEM) to eliminate ALL sewage overflows which can occur during a heavy rain event. We transfer all our sewage to Fort Wayne and sometimes the system can get overloaded. This means raw sewage can get put directly into the river which we don't want. Fort Wayne is dealing with the same mandate via their tunnel project. The original mandate about 15 years ago was to build an overflow treatment plant which at the time was over \$25 million dollars. About 10 years ago, we worked with IDEM to allow New Haven to use an alternative solution which was to build a large storage pipe to hold sewage for 24 hours before sending to Fort Wayne during a heavy rain. The cost of this project was nearly \$18 million dollars and was still more than we thought the community could afford. It would have raised sewer bills quite a bit and we would still be paying Fort Wayne to treat mostly clean rainwater.

City Council sets the rates for public utilities, and we have all worked hard to come up with a solution that will keep our rivers cleaner, while keeping the lowest cost possible to the City.

GET TO KNOW YOUR CITY COUNCIL AND HOW IT WORKS

- The government of cities is divided between the mayor and the common council.
- The mayor exercises the executive authority (I.C. 36-4-4-3) of the city and is primarily concerned with its day-to-day operations.
- The Common Council exercises the city's legislative authority (I.C. 36-4-4-4) and makes the laws that govern the city and appropriates the city's monies.
- City Council members are part-time elected officials who serve a 4-year term. There are no term limits for City Council.
- City Council meetings are held on the 1st and 3rd Tuesday of the month.
- New Haven's legislative body consists of 5 councilmanic districts and 2 at-large districts for the area.

City Council Responsibilities

- New Haven City Council serves 2 primary functions for the City:

Legislative Body – City Council exercises the passage of ordinances.

Fiscal Body – City Council fixes the annual salaries of all elected officials of the city and establishes the annual salaries of members of the City's police and fire departments.

Council also has the authority to reduce, but not increase any other items in the city budget as submitted by the Mayor for its approval.

Partnerships

- City Council works with Allen County officials for approval of capital projects. (I.C. 6-1-29.5-10). New Haven City Council also works with Allen County Commissioners and other officials from Allen County regarding issues in New Haven.
- City Council must abide by state statute requirements and state mandates.
- City Council members work with state elected officials on issues that affect New Haven.

Ordinances

An Ordinance is a local law prescribing a general and permanent rule. The introduction of an ordinance includes a summary presentation of the ordinance at a City Council meeting. Some ordinances may require public hearings. Ordinances are read and voted on prior to any passage.

Parker Towing & Recovery is celebrating 90 years of service and they have a reason to celebrate.

Parker Service, Inc, originally Parker Service Center, began as a small grocery store and gas station with a one-bay auto repair shop in 1934 which was started by Homer Parker. With a rich history and location, the business expanded to a two-bay repair shop in 1954 when Larry, Homer's son, took over. With a shotgun, a movie projector, and a small loan from his brother, Larry added the first manufactured tow truck to the repair shop. As the business continued to grow in the service area, Larry expanded in 1956, and again in 1971 with the addition of two more service bays.

In the early 60's, Larry was approached by the County Sheriff and Indiana State Police to provide towing and recovery services. As the demand for services grew, he purchased a Holmes 650 wrecker, unaware that his purchase was the start of our future in heavy-duty towing and recovery.

In the late 1980's, Homer and Larry passed down their passion and knowledge to Daniel, Larry's youngest son, until the passing of Homer in 1988. During this time, the first flatbed wrecker and an international 40-ton heavy-duty wrecker were added to the fleet. By the time Dan graduated in 1989, Parker's had acquired another county sheriff department's towing and recovery. With the need of additional trucks, Dan purchased his first tow truck in 1992.

With the towing business growing and becoming the main focus, Parker's incorporated in 1992 and became what is now known as Parker Service, Inc. Business ran a steady course until 1997 when Parker's was awarded the towing contract with the City of Fort Wayne. With this contact, the fleet increased and the number of employees grew.

Dan became the sole stockholder in the company in 2006 and made the decision to close the repair shops to put 100% effort into the towing and recovery services. Dan took over full ownership in 2010 and added five more towing companies to the Parker name, including: Kelley Wrecker (2010), Hinsey Towing (2011), Mace Body Shop in Van Wert, OH (2011), Allen County Towing (2011), Dan's Towing (2012), Affordable Towing (2018), Pro Tow of Indiana (2022), and Robinson Wrecker Service (2022). The addition of Kelley Wrecker enabled Parker's to have a second, central location which was greatly needed. With the acquisitions in 2022, we brought aboard Woodburn and New Haven police departments. This has been a great fit for our company.

Today, all of the towing companies acquired have taken the Parker name and are servicing the Fort Wayne and Allen County areas, which include the Fort Wayne, Allen County, DeKalb County, and Indiana State Police agencies, among others. In 2019, Dan decided to take on another aspect of business and purchased Tammy's Towing and its affiliate Tammy's Automotive. The purchase of a salvage yard allowed Parkers to run more efficiently and create another form of revenue. In 2021, Dan added another salvage operation, Legal Chop Shop, which sells new and used auto parts.

Parker's now employs over 120 people and operates over 140 trucks, trailers, and other forms of equipment such as flatbeds, rotators, low boy trailers, forklifts and more. The additions of Tammy's Auto Recycling and legal chop shop have greatly helped to support the Parker operations. Congratulations to Parker Towing & Recovery for 90 years of service.
