
Brushstrokes of Genius

Founded in 1865, New Haven has a long and rich history. This past year, that history has been captured, chronicled and displayed through the works of talented artists. Across our community,

residents and visitors alike can embark on a journey to the past, exploring elements of New Haven as it evolved into the city we know and love today. We have installed eight functional art pieces throughout the city — benches and planters made from repurposed wind turbine blades — that illustrate life in New Haven throughout its first 100 years. We invite citizens, history buffs and everyone in between to visit these pieces and reflect on how far our great city has come.

These pieces thoroughly represent New Haven in its infancy, growing alongside the canals and railroads that made the area known as a transportation hub. In addition to these beautiful benches and planters, some additional art features created in 2024 offer glimpses of modern New Haven. Others blend our past, present and future.

The painting featured on the cover shows New Haven's downtown district as it is today, while nodding to the community's Americana roots.

The piece featured below, which has been installed as part of Allen County's Bicentennial Celebration, sits just east of New Haven City Hall. Mayor's Address

Thank you to New Haven's residents, business owners, and supporters who continue to invest, visit, and live in this great city. It is an honor to serve the City of New Haven and experience along with our residents and business owners the continued progress and prosperity of the City that many of us call home. When I ran for Mayor six years ago, I promised a bold vision of progress for New Haven. In 2024, we delivered on that promise. In 2024, we saw continued growth in housing and business developments. Notable among those projects is the Trainfo project, which provides motorists with real-time information about train blockages, enabling drivers to either wait out a stopped train or find an alternate route.

In 2025, we will continue to move forward with our bold vision. The City looks forward to the start of the Fields of Grace development project. The continued development of the Lincoln Highway Trail is another area of focus, along with scheduled improvements to our infrastructure that will support both existing and

new businesses and residents in New Haven.


Coming in 2025, the City of New Haven will launch a community mental health initiative aimed at helping residents find mental support when they need it most. To launch this initiative, we've partnered with CredibleMind to roll out a wellness website accessible to all New Haven residents.

Residents will continue to see other initiatives that will improve their quality of life. We will continue to develop the Trainfo system to provide information about blocked rail crossings. We will continue to improve the City's communications, including utilization of Activate New Haven, the City's newest communication hub.

We look forward to the opportunities that await us in 2025, and we will meet the challenges head on, turning them into opportunities as well. Protect and Serve

From Chief James Krueger

In 2024 we added two new full-time police officers Logen Brookmyer and Ana Acevedo. Both have responded to training very well and graduated from the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy on December 13th. Officer S. Derickson was promoted to Corporal and is working on 3rd shift under Sergeant Lininger. The open position of Business Resource Officer was awarded to Officer Beard in which he has already begun to make connections with local businesses. I worked with the Merit Board to streamline our hiring process which has been a success. We opened the hiring process in late September and offered three applicants the open positions by the end of November. Normally a hiring process takes over six months.

In 2024, we installed license plate readers (LPRs) on Maplecrest Extended and Rose Avenue, both went live in October. Three more are scheduled to be installed, however they are awaiting permitting issues. In the short two months the LPRs have assisted in six investigative stops which have resulted in traffic citations and the recovery of narcotic drugs including meth and fentanyl. I am currently working with Motorola to update our entire fleet with updated

camera systems and new updated body cameras, all data will now be stored on the “cloud” with Motorola.

As always this was another challenging yet rewarding year for the New Haven Police Department. Our three Patrol Sergeants, three Patrol Corporals and the Deputy Chief continue to do an outstanding job and I hear positive feedback from those they lead as well as citizens in the community. Our Detectives continue to do a great job investigating crimes and working with other agencies as well as the Prosecutor’s Office to see that justice is served for our citizens.

Our Dispatch Supervisor works relentlessly to make sure we have proper staffing and will adjust his own hours when necessary to fill any voids.

I could not be prouder of our employees who continue to be engaged in the welfare of this department and the citizens we serve. I appreciate the continued support and positive relationship with the Mayor’s Office, City Council, Clerk-Treasure, Board of Works, and the Police Merit Board.

With Moose's arrival, New

Public Works

From Superintendent Dave Jones

As the Utility Superintendent for the City of New Haven, my main goals include:

- Motivate the employees and provide a safe work environment
- Inform and create a clear vision for the dept. and our customers
- Find efficiencies and modernize jobs and processes
- Maintain the City's infrastructure (water, sewer, storm and streets)
- Ongoing training for the Utility employees, safety and best practices
- Update equipment when appropriate or repurpose and repair
- Be responsive to our citizen's concerns and questions

January winter weather has been mild the last couple of years. The savings on road salt has allowed us to update some of our equipment. The Public Works Utility building turned 20 years old this year and had new windows, plumbing and epoxy floors done in 2024.

The City's battles with I&I (inflow and infiltration) in our sanitary sewer system are still a major concern. The City constructed a new Wet Weather Treatment Facility on Rose Avenue to treat sanitary sewer overflows before it is discharged into the Maumee River. This helps keep our rivers clean and saves the rate payer from a sewer rate increase. We also continue to clean and televise our sanitary sewers around the city to find substandard pipes and connections for repair or replacement.

The City paved over one million dollars of roads in 2024 with the state's Community Crossing Projects. This will continue in 2025, helping to update prolonged road maintenance.

Leaf pick up went off without a hitch; the City collected 720 tons of leaves from late October to the first week of December. These will be composted at the Utility Department complex on Summit Street and redistributed to the public free of charge.

CDL random drug testing results were 100% negative, and the Utility Department has never had a positive drug test result.

The Utility Department completed over 1,000 work orders and monthly meter reads for its almost 6,000 water and sewer customers.

We continue to work on ADA sidewalk and ramp concerns throughout the City.

The City of New Haven received the tree City USA designation again this year, for the 11th year in a row.

This new year will bring many of the same challenges and some new ones to the department. I believe we will be up to the challenge and look forward to the opportunity to serve the citizens of New Haven now and into the future.

ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT

From Engineering and Project Manager Rick Kruchten

The Engineering Department experienced some personnel changes in 2024, but through it all, we maintained our mission to continue to provide timely and cost-efficient municipal engineering services to our residents, development partners, and local businesses. We said goodbye to a 30-year veteran of New Haven Engineering as Tye Campbell retired. We welcomed Jen Basting as she was promoted to Engineering Field Supervisor and Brook Rutherford as Engineering Technician.

First, I want to extend a thank you to the Engineering Department staff who rose to the challenges of keeping track of the unprecedented number of projects that we completed in 2024. They went above and beyond to ensure projects were completed to specifications and to the expectations of “government at the speed of business” that the administration believes and delivers daily. The team communicated with residents affected by construction and answered all questions they may have had.

The Engineering Department has a close relationship with the Public Works Department to effectively plan and perform maintenance to the city’s 80 plus miles of streets. These projects typically range from asphalt resurfacing, crack sealing, sidewalk replacement, filling potholes and maintaining lift stations, just to name a few.

Engineering is responsible for inspection of any new infrastructure (i.e. Sanitary Sewer, Storm Sewer, Water main, and Streets) that are installed within the city. Along with our new infrastructure projects, the team performs various infrastructure testing, permit reviews, sewer tap installations, and new driveway and sidewalk installation inspections within the city’s right-of-way.

Engineering is also tasked with the inspection work for MS4 (Municipal Separated Sewer System) where the city monitors residential, commercial and industrial sites on a recurring and continuous basis for potential sources of pollution that find their way into the stormwater system, which eventually finds its way to the riverways. Our city is blessed with two certified individuals with several years of experience performing this inspection and enforcement. Larger projects we worked on this year: the completion of Community Crossings resurfacing of 24 streets (13.1 Lane Miles), a new \$4.7 million Wet Weather Treatment Facility — with a previous price tag of over \$16 million, saving the rate payers over \$10 million — and a concrete sidewalk & street maintenance project with 259 sidewalk panels and 70 street panels repaired. We had an extremely busy and rewarding 2024 and look forward to an even more exciting 2025.

All According to Plan

In 2024, the Planning Department has experienced many changes. In January we hired an assistant Planner/GIS specialist, Tyler Smith, who has been updating online mapping and taking a role in reviewing commercial and industrial projects. In July, the staff was able to add an additional assistant Planner as the needs of the city have grown. Karma Rowe was hired to assist with residential permitting as well as coordination of the Plan Commission and Board of Zoning Appeals. These two members have been a pivotal asset and have allowed the department to function at a higher level.


The city has seen substantial traditional residential growth, with the department issuing 101 new single-family home permits. Along with 96 duplexes and 60 multifamily homes, the city's housing has increased in diversity and density with many new options to accommodate our citizens.

Our department has reviewed and approved several types of residential developments. This includes Landin Point with 50 townhouse units, Gateway Phase 1 with 60 apartments, and Crossroads with 136 units. The city has seen growth in our existing subdivisions as well. Victoria Lakes received


approval to complete Section 4, adding an additional 36 homes that will begin early next year. Arbor Park is in the final stages of completion; Kennebec, which has a section of attached townhomes, has also started seeing construction; and Lakes of Pinestone and Timber Creek are both close to completion.

In December, the 1,000th Culver's Restaurant opened at the intersection of SR 930 and Maplecrest. There is also a new MidWest America Credit Union, the Tube Car Wash, and Take 5 Oil Change providing additional amenities to our city. Our industrial sector has also expanded with the introduction of the HillTip American headquarters which is a Finland based company that manufactures snow and ice removal machinery and equipment. They're a great addition to our Wayne Haven Industrial Park, and will be creating more jobs for the community.

The jurisdictional boundary of the city has also grown with annexations that have added approximately 200 acres of land. Several of these properties have been slated as part of the Field of Grace Sports Complex Development and will be a great commercial anchor on the east side of town.

All Play at the Parks

The 2024 Parks and Recreation year saw significant changes, including staff transitions, leadership shifts, and the start of several major projects. New Director Nicholas W. Goranson is focused on building on previous accomplishments and taking the parks to new heights. This year included successful seasonal activities, such as the M3 festival, and a solid pool season despite lower attendance. Maryland's Farm Park made progress with infrastructure improvements.

The department faced the challenge of managing a large number of seasonal operations, including pool openings, hiring staff, and maintaining 18 properties.

Throughout the year, staff worked hard to ensure the smooth operation of

programs, sports events, and community services, while preparing for the holiday season. The pool had around 24,000 visits this year! A significant incident at the pool was handled quickly, saving a life, highlighting the importance of well-trained staff.

Looking to the future, the department faces the challenge of aging infrastructure, particularly with the Jury Pool and exterior restrooms across the parks. Goranson is committed to improving operations without relying on property tax funding and is focused on creating a sustainable, efficient system. He plans to grow the parks while ensuring they remain safe, fun, and healthy spaces for the community. With a strong foundation in place, Goranson is optimistic about the future and grateful for the support from the Park Board.



Growing our Economy

To adapt to New Haven's ever-changing landscape, our Economic Development team actively seeks opportunities to support local businesses and drive economic growth. This included attending 16 informational sessions, workshops, and conferences in 2024. These events provided innovative strategies for attracting retailers, insights into market trends, and tools to leverage the area's unique strengths. They also helped us develop a data-driven outreach strategy and introduced us to a new database for managing business connections.

Our training sessions covered diverse topics, from real

estate redevelopment and reuse to preparing our future workforce, all guided by a shared focus on enhancing the quality of life and quality of place for our community. As part of these efforts, our team attended a retail trade show in Indianapolis, connecting with over 350 company representatives seeking to expand their business. These interactions resulted in valuable new relationships with a variety of brands. Moving forward, we plan to strengthen these connections and apply the insights gained from our training to attract retailers that align with our community's vision, fostering sustainable growth and improved amenities for residents.

Our Rail Summit

In Indiana, the presence of railroads plays a pivotal role in the livelihood of numerous communities, shaping their economic landscapes and influencing daily life. With countless communities feeling the impact of rail activity, it's imperative that we foster a collective understanding of challenges and collaboratively strive for solutions. In February of 2024, we hosted the first Rail Summit, bringing representatives from the rail industry, innovative technology, government leaders and community advisors together.

By coming together in this initiative, we acknowledge the interconnectedness of our interests and the potential for synergy in our efforts. Through shared understanding and concerted action, we can address concerns such as safety, and infrastructure maintenance with greater efficacy, ensuring a more sustainable and harmonious coexistence with

railroads.

This collaborative approach transcends individual interests, emphasizing the collective well-being of Hoosier communities and the broader network of stakeholders involved. Together, we embark on a journey of partnership and problem-solving.

Serving our Community

The Community Development Department continues to be proactive in fostering the city's growth and success. Community Development began 2024 as part of the Economic and Community Development Department for the City of New Haven. During the first part of 2024, our team began looking for solutions to disruptive train stops throughout the city. While this is an ongoing issue, the listening session held in July is a strong indicator of our dedication to making sure New Haven is connected and successful.

We also secured a Safe Streets for All grant for \$140,000. This grant will enable the establishment of a comprehensive Safety Action Plan, making New Haven a more walkable and bikeable city, ensuring our streets are safe for everyone.

Not only did Community Development work to secure grant funding for projects in the community, but our staff also organized community events including New Haven's Flag Day Celebration, Summer Fest, Patriot Day, Fall Fest, and Holiday Homecoming. These events could not have happened without the generous support of donors and the efforts of our many volunteers. We are thankful for those who support the community through giving of their time and resources. In August, Community Development became its own department within the City of New Haven with the hire of a new Community Development Director. After becoming its own department, Community Development undertook several communications projects. To enhance communication with the community, in cooperation with Civify, we launched Activate New Haven, the city's newest communications hub. In its first month, Activate New Haven received 4,830 visitors to the site. This is approximately 30% of New Haven residents.

Community Development began work with Credible

Mind to create a new community mental health care website for the city, which will launch in 2025. This website will be accessible to all residents of New Haven, enabling them to find mental health care when they need it.

Community Development is undertaking a community wide education initiative that will help the community understand vital information such as utility bills, and public works projects. The purpose of this public education project is to help residents to better understand how their city government works for them.

In addition to new projects, the Community Development Department continued with ongoing projects including updates to the City's website, the installation and utilization of a new electronic sign outside of city hall, and updates to internal communications including television monitors inside city hall to provide information for visitors.

A holistic approach to community development requires cooperation with all city departments. Exemplifying this cooperation, Community Development worked with the Department of Public Works and the Engineering Department to implement Trainfo, helping the community to better navigate the presence of the railroad in New Haven. Utilizing censors, electronic sign boards, and social media, Trainfo provides information to the community about blocked railroad crossings, enabling motorists to find alternative routes when needed. These projects and initiatives continue to help the community remain cohesive, vibrant and welcoming to all people who live within the boundaries of New Haven. In this way, everyone who calls New Haven home can participate in the "art of progress."


